


It took some time to revive a very worried Mr. Wastell.

The following are reprinted from the booklet, CRICKET'S FUN

Chlockers' interest in cricket is greater if they are fully switched on to its finer points.

If you are behind with the ins and outs of the game,

brush up by studying this definition :

In cricket you have two sides, one out on the field and the other in. Each can on the side that's in goes out. When he's out he comes in and the next man goes in until he's out.

When the side that's in is all out, the side that's been out comes in, and the side that's been in goes out

and tries to get out the one that's coming in.

Sometimes you get men still in and not out when the side that is in is finally out.

When both sides have been in and out twice, including those who are in and not out, that's the end of the game.

TICKLISH MOMENT

Captaining Australia against England at Lord's in 1962, while Benaud looked on with a strained shoulder, Neil Harvey often fielded wherever he thought a catch likeliest to come.
