

# OFFICIALS UPSET OVER PROTEST! - Anti-Carnegie South attitude continues

Before this season began, the Caulfield Districts Cricket Agsociation was in danger of being disbanded. However, because of the hard work of the Executive committee of the C.D.C.A., more teams were found and the Association continued.

Therefore, this is no time for responsible people on that committee to be slinging mud at any club in this Association, as has been done to us over the last few weeks. For the past five years at least, we have been the "chopping block" for the Association to continually single us out for petty things that practically every other club did as well as us. It was always Carnegie South that was made the scapegoat.

Now that we have claimed points for a technicality, some Association officials, who should know better, want to tear us to shreds. We did not like seeing the young East Caulfield side lose their points for such a trivial matter. and would not have said anything more on the matter had the protest been dismissed. We protested because it is the C.D.C.A. executive and other clubs that have taught us the hard way to read our rules thoroughly and to find any loopholes.

BUT, if the occassion arises in the future, when we are in the wrong, then I'm sure that no club will hesitate to protest against us, as they have done in tha past. It would be very interesting to hear the comments of the gentlemen concerned about the game in which Glenvern claimed and received full points from us in season 1968-69 because of a mix-up in the grounds, which was brought about because the Association had made a bungle of the draw. Our team was ten minutes late in arriving at our ground after already attending the Glenvern ground. I doubt if the gentlemen making the most noise over this incident would remember. It is obvious that they don't. Nothing was said about this protest as it was only Carnegie South that lost full points without a ball being bowled. We don't intend to look for loopholes such as these if we are given a "fair go" to play cricket as it should be played, without having to resort to technicalities in the rules. cont'd over.

Once again I repleat taht our club has always been on the receiving end; and now that we have brought this case to light; we hopr we have closed the book on such incidents, hoping also that the much-upset officials can see our point of view and why we feel that we were justified, if unhappy, to protest.

There are two sides to every dispute, and we are happy to be able to state our case now, as we were not permitted to do so at the meeting. This is no time for petty arguments within the Association as the C.D.C.A. is struggling through a tough period.

We have full confidence in the C.D.C.A. executive as a group. Only the prejudiced attitude towards our club of one or two members has caused us concern. We would hate these attitudes to continue as it could do nothing but harm to the Association and the respect that all players have for the Executive committee.

#### BEST PLAYER AWARD

#### Round 1. EAST CAULFIELD v CARNEGIE SOUTH

After having nineteen players at practice the week before, only nine players turned out to play the first day against East Caulfield. It was a bad start and set the pattern for the rest of the game, as we never looked liked winning at any stage. East Caulfield won the toss and sent us in to bat. D.Pitman (3), R.King (10), N.Dettman (8) and J.O'Mara (1) were quickly back in the pavallion, with the score at 4/28.

Alan Johanson made the score a little more respectable with a very fine 41. He was aided by "Normie" Lamb, who scored a valuable 11 in his first game with the club. However, we were all out for 89. East Caulfield then batted and declared at 7/194, with "Bomber" McSwain taking 4/54. Our second innings was worse than our first although webhad nothing to fight for. Alan Johanson was once again top-scorer with 28 out of car total of 75. Once again it was the same old story of relying on too few batsmen to score the runs.

WHAT A GAME ... The second game against Caulfield Socials produced a thrilling tie and was played in the right sporting spirit throughout. The result was a fitting one as both teams were very even. Caulfield Socials won the toss and sent us in to bat. Once again, our early batsmen let us down and we were struggling for runs. Ron King was the only batsman to show any resistance and scored a sturdy 29. Tailender Doug Cosby also batted well for 14 out of our final score of 90. Caulfield Socials then batted and were 4/49 at stumps on the first day. Noel Dettman and Alan Johanson were bowling brilliantly and had the Caulfield Socials' batsman in diabolical trouble. On the second day, Caulfield Socials added 41 runs to be level with our first innings score.

At this stage they had lost only eight wickets and victory was just around the corner. However, our bowlers were not yet defeated and Alan Johanson bowled a beautiful in-swinger to clean up their minth wicket. Their last man then came to the crease with one run needed for victory. It was a very nervous Alan Johanson who bowled the next ball - another sharp inswinger, but a defensive shot prolonged the agony. The next ball was a "beauty" but the batsman managed to push it away on the leg side. Immediately, the batsmen set off for the winning run but Brian Lyons (after a bit of teasing) scooped up the and tossed it to Alan Johanson who knocked down the srumps, with the batsman still out of hos ground.

We batted again and finished with 111 for the loss of seven wickets. Noel Dettman called the tune with a brilliant 50, with Alan Johanson and Daryl Pitman scoring 16 and 15 respectively.

Mention must be made of the superb bowling of Alan Johanson, "Bomber" McSwain and Noel Dettman in this game. It was their efforts that enabled us to stay in the game and eventually fight back when the pressure was really on. Another contributing factor in this game was the tight fielding of our players, in what was our best fielding performance for many years.
