

## THE FIRST ELEVEN IN SEASON 1994/95 - THE VICE CAPTAIN'S VIEW

I have always believed that the 'B' Grade Premiership team of 1986/87 was the best cricket side that I have played in. However, I now have to revise my opinion and say that this season's 'C' Grade Premiers is a better team. I think that the 1994/95 Carnegie South First XI had a better balanced team with a greater depth of talent than that which won the flag in 1986/87. Also there are two players who played in both premierships, and I would hazard to say that they are both better players now than the eighteen year olds who played in that '86/87 team eight years ago.

Right from the pre-season, the talk was always of a Firsts premiership. This was perhaps a trifle ambitious at the time - not because we weren't capable of it, but because there was still the small matter of playing the eleven games of the regular season necessary to make the finals. We started the season slowly and gradually improved, but from about the half-way mark of the season right to the end, we consistently played at near peak form, and any opponent coming against us was always going to have to play exceptionally well to defeat us.

The highlight of the regular season was undoubtedly the victory against Bentleigh Uniting in Round 3. They batted first and we had them six for fifty at one stage. Then the rain came down, the ball turned into a bar of soap and our fielding fell apart (with myself the worst offender). They gave us a right old caning after tea and finished the day at nine for 278 - an unbelievable recovery from their earlier position. Throughout the following week we retained confidence in our ability to make the runs, but there were certainly plenty of nerves about it's one thing to make 300 when you're batting first and there's no pressure on, it's a completely different situation when you're chasing and you need 280 to win. The run chase started slower than we would have liked and we lost three wickets before tea. Uniting were definitely in the winning position as the fiftieth over approached. The situation came down to us needing just over 100 at about seven runs per over to win - and we got them. Marty Reid and Barry Bates played a couple of gems to get us home with a few overs to spare. However Tim Gallagher's ninety-six was by far the best knock of the day, and in my opinion the best innings of the regular season. Tim batted for a large part of the day, scored his runs at a good rate and carried us from an unhealthy position to within sight of victory. The feelings as we approached the target and finally passed it were sensational; it's without doubt the best victory I've ever experienced in a home and away match.

The lowlight of our season came exactly one game later - Round 4 against Albert Park on that pathetic little ground of theirs. We again bowled first and the bowlers did reasonably well to get them out for 216. After the successful run chase of the previous round we were sure we'd make the runs. Unfortunately we lost wickets at a fairly steady rate throughout the day. On a small, quick ground where it was extremely easy to score runs, we didn't bat intelligently at all and were bowled out about fifty runs short with plenty of overs to spare. If

the players had only placed a bit of value on their wickets and not worried so much about the quantity of runs still needed to pass Albert Park's score, we could have won this match as well.

In previous years I've always felt that the bowling department has been the strength of the team, but this year was different. I thought that the batting was very good for nearly all of the season, and was a little better than the bowling (my judgement may be less than impartial in this). Dave Norris continued and surpassed his huge scoring feats of the previous season, and this year Tim Gallagher joined the party. Having produced two seasons on the trot of such massive scoring, I think there's no doubt that Duck was the best batsman in 'C' Grade. In fact I now have to rate him as the best batsman I've seen at Carnegie South. The other top notch batsmen I've played with were never able to produce one such season, let alone two in a row.

Every one of our four main bowlers of the year - Barry Bates, Mark McSwain, Colin Moore and Marty Reid - contributed to the team, but in a way that wasn't quite the norm. For the majority of the year it seemed that one bowler would have a day out and take a bag, and the others would just clean up the remnant. Each of the four had at least one game where they were the matchwinner, but it wasn't until the last couple of home and away matches that the wickets were shared evenly between three of four bowlers.


The fielding throughout the year, in particular the catching, wasn't as good as it should have been (again, I was undoubtedly the worst fielder in the team in the early part of the season). It was sub-standard for most of the season, but picked up for the last few games and, importantly, we hardly made a mistake during the two finals. I've always believed that if we live up to our ability, there's not a better fielding team than the Carnegie South First XI. However we didn't live up to our ability and an amazing number of catches went down. As I said it wasn't until the season neared its end that all the catches that came to hand stuck. Some of the better fielders deserve a mention and Shane Dobson, after a slow start, kept excellently for most of the season. Brett Handley, when he came into the side, was very sharp at short leg and took a lot of catches in only a small number of games. Andrew Grant was the outstanding catcher of the year. On those very rare occasions when he let a catch through, it took a few moments for the rest of the team to overcome their state of shock. Andy is the best slipper we've had since Alan Johanson, and he's definitely every bit as good as Joh was.

This brings me to the finals - but I don't have much to say about our performances in these two games except to congratulate the eleven blokes who were a part of that Premiership team. I would also like to thank all those people who turned up to support us during the games and who helped us celebrate after the Grand Final; their presence was much appreciated by the players. We came into the finals with ten wins and one loss - statistically the best team in 'C' Grade - and we were good enough to uphold that record through the two finals matches. The members of the Carnegie South First XI can be very proud of their performances during the season and especially during the game that counted most of all. I must also extend my congratulations to the Fourths who enjoyed a well-deserved

Premiership too.

Finally I would like to congratulate Sean Carroll on being a Carnegie South First XI Premiership captain. There aren't too many of them around, and it's certainly something Sean can take great pride in. I look forward to the new season in 'B' Grade and the challenges in store for us there. ## CARNEGIE SOUTH U/14's SEASON 1994/95

The 1994/95 Under 14 team emulated the feat of their predecessors by finishing on top of the ladder at the end of the home and away fixtures, and then went one step further by securing a Grand Final berth. Unfortunately, their quest for Premiership glory ended on a sour note - dowsed with controversy - as they were beaten by just two runs in a game where most of the breaks seemed to go the way of an East Sandringham side that "peaked" at the right end of the season.

The season commenced with what, it seems, has become the usual question - "Will there be enough players to field a side?". Round 1, which was a grading match, saw us pitted against our neighbours and fierce rivals, Carnegie, with only eight players. The result went the way of the opposition, which was perhaps fortuitous, as it meant that the team was placed in "C" grade. The problem still remained, however - more players were needed, otherwise it would be a long, tough haul to remain competitive. Luckily, in the following weeks, the situation was rectified with the additions of Alex Pinto, Daniel Mentiplay, Andrew Pelman, Brad Muscat and Sam Gifford - after his brief sojourn into athletics. Thus, the team could now look forward to fielding a full side for the rest of the season and concentrate on winning games, rather than saving them.

The Round 2 fixture against Dingley saw us compile the large score of 2/178, the star being the Skipper, Mark Picone, who continued on with his match-winning form of last season as he chalked up another fifty. Ashley Peake and Matthew Yodgee also did well after being elevated in the batting order. The Dingley side never really had a chance when faced with that sizeable chase, and Carnegie South had them 8 wickets down when the 40 overs were up, still 63 runs in advance.

Eventual Grand Final opponents, East Sandringham Boys Club, were handily bested by our boys in Round 3. Paul Slade took over the spotlight, as he compiled his first fifty of the year and followed it up with a couple of wickets in their innings. Simon Chandler also chipped in with two.

Our home game in Round 4 against Albert Park/South Melbourne Districts started off disastrously, with both openers being dismissed cheaply. The "Redbacks" never really recovered and only a face-saving partnership between Cameron Pinto and John Ure, which lasted well over an hour, saved total humiliation. Although they lost the game, one highlight to emerge was Cameron's career best haul of 5/20 - a terrific effort.

This game proved to be a spur that drove the team on to much greater heights, as we then won seven matches in a row, including the Semi-Final against A.P.S.D., who had humbled us in the aforementioned game, to reach the Grand Final for the first time since 1985/86. In this period, both Paul and Mark continued to dominate with the bat, the wickets continued to be shared around between all the bowlers, the fielding and encouragement was sensational and Brad Muscat arrived at the club - purple "Oakley's" and all!

What made it worse was that poor weather conditions marred an exceptional contest between two very talented sides. Our team certainly bore the brunt in this area, as I believe that East Sandy's score would have been a lot less than it finished up, had a dry ball been available for our bowlers to use on the first morning. Still, these are things that must be put up with, and to our credit, not one team-member dropped their head at any stage.

The run chase started off in magnificent fashion with an unbroken century opening stand. This gradually gave way to a period of uncertainty as wickets fell, and then nervous tension as the result became balanced on a knife-edge. Unfortunately, a horrible situation faced Mark Picone as he strode back out to the crease - 7 runs needed to tie the match (and therefore take the pennant) off only three deliveries. The sad thing to follow was that Mark was left to hit four runs off the last ball of the day - a terrible burden and one that was borne with immense character by the captain. Things did not pan out and we were left as runners-up, but the effort of the team in almost reaching the pinnacle of the season must not go unnoticed.

Several highlights emerged from the season. Alex Pinto bowled exceptionally well, especially throughout the Finals series, where he captured six wickets, and followed it up with some excellent fielding. Ashley Peake's hat-trick against Bentleigh was sensational. Mark Picone's batting was also first-class and was topped off by the manner in which he led the side. The star of the side was undoubtedly Paul Slade. Enough cannot be stated about the efforts of Paul, who hit up 418 runs at an average of 83.60, including 5 fifty's (he was robbed of another one), and also captured 24 scalps. These are incredible statistics for a junior player. The real highlight, though, was the closeness of the team and the subsequent spirit that they developed. To look at how they felt after the loss in the Grand Final was very moving, yet also inspiring, as it showed just how much it meant to them to be a part of the club.

In winding up, I would like to extend my appreciation to all the parents, especially those who gave up time to provide transport. Dave Jansen must also be thanked for helping run things on a Saturday morning and for driving the boys to away venues. Most importantly, the players themselves must take most of the accolades, as they were the ones who performed on the ground and got us to the point they did. So, to Mark Picone, Ashley Peake, Paul Slade, Simon Chandler, Sam Gifford, Daniel Mentiplay, Brad Muscat, Andrew Pelman, Alex Pinto, Cameron Pinto, John Ure and Matthew Yodgee, very well done and I sincerely hope that you continue your careers at Carnegie South.

# CARNEGIE SOUTH UNDER 12's - THE 1994/95 SEASON IN REVIEW -

The 1994/95 season for the U/12's will be one remembered for many things - among them, the number of boys who showed the desire to play (seventeen!), the undoubted improvement of all the players, the great team spirit exhibited and the outstanding individual performances. However, the one aspect that was most extraordinary to me was the way that all the players wanted to immerse themselves completely in the game of cricket itself - to understand the tactics, to continually practise, to talk about the matches they had played in, to analyse their own performances, et cetera, et cetera - which was incredible when considering the age group that we were dealing with.

The season proper commenced on a cold, dreary Saturday morning in early October. We travelled to Murrumbeena Secondary College and had an easy victory against an undermanned and inexperienced South Caulfield team. Since this was only a grading match, no points were gained - the main benefit, however, was that it gave some of our new players an experience of what it takes to contribute to a team.

This result meant that the side was placed in "C" grade, and our first "real" match pitted the "Redbacks" against East Sandringham Boys Club. Our Captain, Johan Jegerajan, won the toss and elected to bat. The boys posted a defendable target of 98, with Tom Nolan, Carl Schleiger and Daniel te Hennepe all batting solidly. As it turned out, this target was too much of an ask for the East Sandy boys as they folded for only 35. They showed a bit more steel in the second innings, however, and managed to avoid an outright loss.

Unfortunately, after the good start to the season, our worst performance in the field and with the ball followed in Round 3 against Omega. In extremely windy and cold conditions, we could only manage to capture one opposition wicket as Omega hit up 153 runs. The fact that we had given away 60 extras did not help our run chase the following week and only our Skipper showed any resistance as we were bowled out for 86.

Brighton East had our measure in the Round 4 fixture at home. Setting a target of 133 off the allotted 40 overs, we again chased poorly and managed 86 (again), with Jonathan Stiglec doing well in his new role as opener and Daniel te Hennepe showing dogged resistance in a long stay at the crease.

Perhaps our best batting performance of the season occurred in Round 5 when the "Redbacks" played Moorabbin Park at home. Playing one man short, we got away to a great start as Tom Nolan and Carl Schleiger put on an opening stand of 73 - Tom making his first 30 and Carl compiling 22. Johan Jegerajan also made a quick-fire 30 and the score had reached 3/121 before a major batting collapse saw us lose 5 quick wickets for the addition of only 12 runs. Tom and Johan, however, returned to the crease and settled things down - adding a further 41 runs in better than even time to leave us with a healthy total of 174 to defend. Tom finished with a very impressive 43 not out and Johan justified his selection in the Association representative side with a tremendous 53. The target was always going to be

too large for Moorabbin Park and they were dismissed for 69 runs. The stars with the ball were Michael Rule and Kristian Damarell, who took 5 wickets between them.

The most memorable game of the season took place after the Christmas break in Round 8 when we faced Heatherton. This game had everything - plenty of wickets, poor ground conditions and identical twins on the opposition team causing headaches for the scorers, to name a few. The ground was extremely slow and wet, and it seemed that the gamble to bat after winning the toss would backfire as the boys got away to a painfully slow start. However, to our credit, we recovered and posted the very respectable tally of 115. Much to our delight, the following week we arrived to find that the grass had not been cut and the opposition coaches were frantically scurrying around with a lawn mower trying to rectify the situation! This was all to no avail as they were scuttled for a miserly 32 - Leo Gifford hogging the limelight with a career best 4 wickets for 2 runs. The Heatherton team was saved from outright loss only by the remaining overs running out, as we had them 6 down in the second dig. The amazing aspect of the day's play was that 12 of the 16 wickets that fell were due to catches - not one of them being straight forward. Probably the most pleasing catch to watch was Mick te Hennepe's gem standing at fine leg, when the batsman hooked the ball low and hard into Mick's waiting hands. It was a purely reflex catch and, judging by the look on Mick's face and the jubilation of his teammates, a real team-lifter.

This brings us onto the topic of fielding. I lost count of the number of times that opposition coaches or managers complimented our team on the terrific standard of our fielding. It really filled me with pride when this occurred as this aspect of the game is considered to be, and definitely is, so important in affecting the outcome of games. It was also correct to point out, as all those people did, that our efforts in the field were first-class throughout the season-the throwing, backing up, encouragement, tremendous saves and incredible run-outs all helped to save runs which kept us in quite a few games which otherwise would have been out of reach.

The giant strides made by all the players in their own ability was the most pleasing aspect when reviewing the season that has, unfortunately, now passed. Team members that might not normally have been directly involved in the game at the time would invariably stick their hand up and respond to the challenge that either Tim or myself might ask of them - a great reflection on the character that these boys possess. Congratulations are certainly extended to all the players on the manner in which they conducted themselves throughout the season - both on and off the field. They are all contributors to the impressive reputation that our club currently holds. To the parents who regularly supported the team, particularly Andrew & Maria Black, Carol Hackwill & Roger Pelletier, Jenny & Terry Rule, Peter Smith & Mary Allison, Peter & Trudi te Hennepe and Fran & Hugh Williamson, many thanks - your presence was definitely beneficial to both players and coaches alike.



#### The Showbags Award: Ben Newell


