

Minutes Of The ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING 7 July 1994

Held at the Bentleigh RSL. The meeting opened at 8.18pm. Present: R.Fauvel (chair), R.Hess (minutes) and members as listed on the attendance sheet. Apologies were received from M.Pierce, C.Grant, T.Barry, S.Warren, B.Harbour, A.Miles and C.Smith.

- 1. Confirmation Of Minutes: a) The minutes of the previous Annual General Meeting, held on 23 June 1993, were accepted on the motion of R.Fauvel and seconded by M.Meredith. b) There were no matters arising from the minutes.
- 2. Correspondence: a) The only item of relevant correspondence was notification of the Annual Meeting of the CMCA.
- 3. Financial Statement: a) The Treasurer presented the Financial Statement as tabled in the club newsletter. It was by suggested by members that greater detail should be presented in future reports, including a comparison with figures from previous seasons.
- 4. Secretary's Report: a) The Secretary gave a verbal report, which included the following points:

On the negative side -

- i) The club can no longer afford to carry unfinancial players. This resolve should continue to be manifested at the selection table and the awarding of trophies.
- ii) The club cannot afford unnecessary administrative errors, since they have the potential to effect not only our on field success but the financial viability of the club.
- iii) The club cannot tolerate any further bad behaviour on or off the field, since a good reputation with the CMCA and the local council is essential for our continued existence as a club.

On the positive side -

- The club reinstituted a successful junior program, culminating in a finals appearance for the Under Fourteens.
- The 'Veterans' Eleven' was instituted, attracting both old and new players to the club.
- iii) The Fifth Eleven won their first ever premiership, an event to be savoured by many in the twilight of their careers.

Other teams also achieved successes during the season, and at one stage the club seemed likely to have four or even five teams in the finals. Given the strength of our club, it is not beyond the realm of possibility that <u>all</u> senior teams will participate in the finals in the very near future. Finally, gratitude must be expressed to Sean Carroll, the senior coach, who can take the credit for a

general improvement in individual player performances over the longer term, Ken Pooley, who once again generously assisted the club with its printing needs, Stuart Warren, who continued to do a magnificent job with statistics, and the General Committee, especially Dirk Barrow, who provided invaluable support in their particular roles.

5. Election Of Office Bearers: a) R.Fauvel was elected unopposed to the position of President. b) P.May and M.Meredith were nominated for the position of Vice President. After D.Barrow and S.Carroll were appointed as Returning Officers, an election by secret ballot was held and P.May was duly elected. c) D.Barrow was elected unopposed to the position of Secretary. d) R.Hess was elected unopposed to the position of Assistant Secretary. e) L.Campbell was elected unopposed to the position of Treasurer. f) P.Booth was elected unopposed to the position of Assistant Treasurer. g) T.Gallagher, N.Barrow and D.Jansen were elected unopposed to the position of General Committee persons. h) Outgoing office bearers were specifically thanked for their contributions over the season.

6. General Business: a) Condolences were expressed to L.Marshall on the recent death of his mother. b) Two applicants would be considered for the position of club coach and members would be informed of the decision made in this regard after discussion by the new Committee. c) It was suggested that more detailed guidelines were needed for the 'Veterans' Eleven' and the Committee agreed to discuss this matter further. d) A proposal to alter the regulations for the Ward Medal was discussed at length, and D.Barrow indicated that he would propose formal changes to the regulations at a special general meeting to be held before the start of the season. e) Details of a Grand Final Day social function were to be advised by mail. f) The Treasurer announced that an increase in subscriptions was unlikely. g) Vacancies for captaincy positions were announced. h) The Bentleigh RSL were thanked for their hospitality.

The meeting closed at 9.13pm.

SELECTION COMMITTEE POLICIES

1. APPOINTMENTS

It shall be the responsibility of the General Committee to select all captaincy and coaching appointments for the season. These appointments shall stand, unless the Selection Committee, due to exceptional circumstances, decides that the interests of the club would be better served by varying these appointments. Should the so-called "exceptional circumstances" persist for more than one game then the Selection Committee <u>must</u> seek the approval of the General Committee before varying the appointment of any captain, vice-captain or coach for a future match.

2. EXCESS OF PLAYERS

When an excess of players exists, the Selection Committee shall, in order of priority, omit ...

- All players who cannot play for the <u>entire</u> duration of the match (ie., those players who can only play on one Saturday, before tea, etc.).
- All 'unfinancial' players (ie., those players designated by the Treasurer as 'unfinancial'. 'Unfinancial', in this sense, shall refer to those players yet to arrange, and adhere to, a satisfactory schedule for the payment of monies owing to the club. The Selection Committee shall consult the Treasurer, or the Executive Committee, to determine the current financial status of club members).
- All 'junior' players (ie., those players eligible to participate in junior cricket competitions).
- All players who have not attended and participated in training sessions without adequate excuse or reason.
- Particular players on the basis of form and/or team balance. No player shall be omitted from any team on this basis more than <u>once</u> during the season.

The Selection Committee, whenever appropriate, shall endeavour to communicate on an individual basis with those players omitted for any of the above reasons. In exceptional cases, the Selection Committee may, with the approval of the Executive Committee, establish different criteria for the selection of individual players.

3. FORFEITS

One of the aims of the Selection Committee shall be to field five senior teams for each round. When this cannot occur due to a lack of players, the Executive Committee shall be consulted to ensure that all reasonable options to field a team have been explored before a forfeit is announced. It shall be the responsibility of the Secretary to notify the opposition club(s) of the decision to forfeit a game, and to submit the appropriate team sheets and press reports.

4. WALKOVERS

When a walkover occurs <u>before</u> all teams are announced, the Selection Committee shall abide by the guidelines applicable to an 'Excess of Players'. When notification of a walkover occurs <u>after</u> all teams have been announced, then the Selection Committee may, if circumstances allow, choose to re-select all teams (in the manner outlined above), or, let the original team selections stand, with the team receiving the walkover excluded from participating in that round. The Secretary shall ensure that appropriate team sheets and press reports are submitted.

VETERANS' TEAM (Recent alterations are indicated by italics)

At the Annual Meeting each year, the formation of a Fifth Eleven 'Veterans' Team', for players preferably aged thirty-five and over, shall be approved by the members. Before the commencement of the season, those eligible players wishing to play in the team shall notify the Secretary in writing of their intention to do so. Those eligible players who have formally nominated for the side shall be the first selected in the team. When there are not enough nominated players available to make up a 'Veterans' Team', the Selection Committee shall approve the selection of either a) other players preferably aged thirty-five and over, or b) other players. Option a) shall be the preferred option, but depending on team balance, performance and so on, option b) may be exercised. If a requirement for players should occur in a higher eleven, a Fifth Eleven player can be selected to meet that requirement, but only after negotiation with that player and the Fifth Eleven captain. When there is an excess of nominated players available for the 'Veterans' Team', players shall be selected in other sides only if vacancies exist according to the criteria for 2. EXCESS OF PLAYERS, outlined above. (However, the requirement for regular attendance and participation at training shall not apply.) If vacancies do not exist in other teams, then players in the 'Veterans' Team' shall be omitted according to the policies relevant to an excess of players. When nominated players are selected in teams other than the 'Veterans' Team', every effort shall be made to communicate the reasons for this decision to them.

6. FINALS

Every effort shall be made to field the best possible team(s) in finals matches, and all the above criteria shall apply in matters of selection. However, <u>under no circumstances shall a player owing monies to the club be selected in a finals team</u>. Moreover, when an excess of eligible players for finals matches occurs, junior players <u>may</u> be selected ahead of senior players only when the junior player(s) concerned have played five or more games in the senior grade in which the final occurs.

7. SELECTION MEETING PROCEDURE

The Selectors shall make every endeavour to resolve disagreements on matters of selection by consensus. When consensus cannot be reached, the Chair of the Selection Committee shall conduct a ballot (by a show of hands) to resolve the issue. Should the initial ballot be a tie, then the Chair may only exercise a second, casting vote after further discussion and a second subsequent ballot has failed to resolve the matter. No captain has the right of veto regarding the selection of their team.

SEASON 1994/95 IN REVIEW - A Round By Round Diary -

ROUND 1

A career best of 6/10 from Barry 'Kunji' Bates helps the First Eleven open the season with a hard fought victory over West Bentleigh. The Second Eleven also open their account with "X" helping himself to five scalps. The Fourths, under new captain David Snape, lose to Hampton United. C.M.C.A. Secretary, Russell Moore, improves his popularity rating at the club even further after saying "not out" to a dirty big snick off a none-too- impressed Mr.Snape. He then makes matters worse after the match by apologizing and saying what a terrible decision it was! The Grand Final replay between the Fifth Eleven and Highett West is a real fizzer with the opposition only fielding seven players in their 85 run defeat.

ROUND 2

"Duck" Norris scores yet another century in the fierce heat to continue his achievements of the previous season. After pulverising the Bentleigh ANA attack for a mammoth score, Sean, in his post-match report, declares that the First Eleven "... can go all the way..." this season. The Second Eleven also notch up a big score with young guns "Madness" and "Barks" both scoring fifties. The Third Eleven go down in a high scoring encounter - despite Peter Fenton's promise of a fifty to Captain Mills. A lack of numbers causes the Fifth Eleven to concede a walkover, but some of the old timers help the Fourth Eleven to an impressive win over North Caulfield/Glenhuntly.

ROUND 3

Fifth Eleven premiership player, Rod Fielden, returns to the club and scores his second century in succession against Shamrock. Attila Kovacs makes his debut for the club in the same game, claiming three wickets as an opening bowler. On a cold, grey Saturday, Ric Hiscock spends his day in the field wearing a white Parka (with hood!).

ROUND 4

The First Eleven lose their first game for the season against the lowly rated Albert Park & SMD. The "Doctor" impresses no-one with his late arrival. An impressive win for the Fourth Eleven, who do not lose a wicket in chasing Mackie's target of 130. The big 'C' scores a big half 'C'. The Fifth Eleven pound the depleted Monash Gryphons to hit up a score in excess of 300. The 'Chief', Mike Redapple, scores a well deserved 50, his first for the club.

ROUND 5

A shortage of players causes a few problems, but four out of five wins is a good result over two very hot Saturdays. Tony Weedon dents Mark Meredith's jaw, and David Mills discovers the frustration of being 'on call' as the Thirds just manage their second win. Budge proves his value in the Fourth Eleven by scoring a half century in their meritorious win.

ROUND 6

Scott Handley debuts in the First Eleven with a fine 67, while brother Brett plays his first game for the year in the Seconds and scores 88. Dave Norris hits up another undefeated century, as both the Firsts and Seconds enter the Christmas break with a 5/1 win/loss ratio. Tom Brain distinguishes himself in the Fifth Eleven with his second duck in a row. 'Pancakes On The Run' cater for our end of the year function, with Craig Smith visiting from Sydney for a few weeks. New 'Redback' shirts become available.

ROUND 7

Firsts and Seconds continue on their merry winning way, consolidating their spot in the finals. 'Truck' Oldershaw displays his all-round ability by taking four wickets and rescuing the Seconds with the bat. Shamrock give the Thirds a hiding, while the Fourths and Fifths lose crucial one-day games in a tight struggle. Dropped to the Thirds, Glenn Townsend top scores with 68 as an opener. 'Lumpy' Moait returns to form and spanks a fine 32 not out in the Fifth Eleven. Australia retain the Ashes with a draw against England in Sydney.

ROUND 8

Tim Gallagher scores an unbeaten century and sets a new club fourth wicket partnership record with Noel Barrow in the First Eleven victory over Washington Park. Colin 'Wobbles' Moore takes ten wickets for the match. Andrew Grant scores his first century for the club in the Second Eleven win against Melbourne Wanderers. The Thirds lose again, but the Fourths reverse the Round 7 result against Dingley to make a late charge for the finals. Dean Slade hits up a quick-fire 76 not out. The 'Veterans' are thumped for 422 runs by Le Page Park, although Lindsay Marshall and Michael Redapple both take wickets. The table tennis table is a big hit.

ROUND 9

The Firsts cruise to a win with "Doc" on a rampage, initially with the ball and then later on at the Trivia Night. The Seconds put in their regular end of the year shocker and are dismissed for 79. Andrew Bradshaw hits an effortless century for the Thirds as they get back on the winning list, while Cameron Newell does the same for David Snape's team. The Fifths continue to struggle and are beaten by Melbourne Wanderers, but Eugene Fredericks makes an impressive debut taking three outfield catches. 'Penguin', 'Froggy' and Tommy Brain stay on at Fawkner Park to enjoy the 'Skyshow'!

ROUND 10

An effortless victory over ESBC for the First Eleven, as all the bowlers take wickets and Dave Norris holds the batting together with an undefeated 156. The Seconds make a brave attempt to chase a total of 400 runs, but 67 by Meredith and 42 for 'Phantom' is not enough on the small Hurlingham Park wicket. The Third Eleven are humbled by Le Page Park - despite the efforts of 'George' Perzuck, who snaffles six catches behind the stumps. Attila Kovacs also notches up his first fifty for the club. In their quest for a finals spot, the Fourth Eleven stumble against Cavaliers. Cameron Newell top scores with 81 and chips in with three wickets, all to no avail. The Fifths get back on the winning list with a strong performance against West Bentleigh, who had won their last six games on end. Simon Farrer scores his maiden century and takes his first five wicket haul for the club in an inspired performance.

ROUND 11

A scorcher to finish off the season. The Firsts make quick work of Hampton Central and return to the club early, while the Seconds suffer their third consecutive defeat at the hands of Cheltenham Park. Unfortunately, Dirk Barrow's 56 and 'Truck's' three wickets are not enough to save the day. The selection of Eugene Fredericks in the Third Eleven is so surprising that it causes him to utter profanity for the first time in his life. However, they finish on a low with a loss to the "Home of the C.M.C.A. Cap" - West Bentleigh. In a memorable and very late finishing game, the Fourths win a thriller and capture a berth in the finals. Roger Barrow is the hero, scoring the winning runs despite batting with a broken finger. The 'Veterans' end their year with a morale-boosting win over Monash Gryphons, scoring the required runs without losing a wicket thanks to Simon Farrer and 'The Chief'. At the Ward Medal count, a small crowd witness a cliffhanger, as 'The Doctor' wins the medal on the last vote of the evening.

SEMI-FINAL

A weekend for the record books. Firstly, four teams play-off for Grand Final berths and the three Barrow brothers set a club record by all playing in the finals at the one time. The First Eleven are well tested against ESBC, but the value of batting first and compiling a big score is borne out. 'Duck' Norris makes 95 and Tim Gallagher makes 60 in a total of 9/327. 'Macca' bowls well without claiming a wicket, while Marty Reid picks up three in a good team performance. Despite our protests at having to play on a sub-standard ground, the Seconds are in with a chance overnight. Dropped chances the next day cost us dearly, and Brighton Union win their way into the Grand Final. Glenn Gallagher top scores with 54, and both Barry Bates and Rob Oldershaw snare four wickets. It is no surprise that the Fourth Eleven game goes the full distance, after Bentleigh Uniting were dismissed for 133 and Carnegie South were 4/84 overnight. With only a slender first innings deficit to counter, Bentleigh Uniting quickly set a target of 120 from forty-two overs in the hope of an outright result, but a masterful knock of 47 not out from Dean Slade ends the game and any hope of Uniting turning the tables. Alan Burridge and Mick Pierce take five wickets each for the game.

GRAND FINAL: WEEK ONE

For the first time in the Club's history, two senior teams compete in a Grand Final together. The Under 14's are also involved, but their game commences a week later. The First Eleven start very shakily, losing three early wickets, before Tim Gallagher, taking advantage of some sloppy Southside fielding, steadies the ship, ably supported by Noel Barrow and Andy Grant. The "D" twins, "Doc" and "Diesel" are not out overnight with the score at 7/196. Meanwhile, the Fourth Eleven Captain, Dave Snape, decides to send North Caulfield/Glenhuntly in to face the music. Honours are evenly shared at stumps on the first day with N.C.G. finishing on 5/187. The early session on the second day proves decisive, with the last five wickets falling for the addition of only 20 runs. "Budge" snags three, whilst "Arnie" and "Deano" take a couple each. As with the Firsts in their match, the Fourths lose both openers early, but Ben Newell has enough confidence to inspire not only himself, but Paul Sinclair and Dean Slade as well. At the end of play on Day 2, the game remains very much in the balance, with 61 runs still required and only 4 wickets in hand . The First Eleven match also pans out in much the same way. Our boys are dismissed early for 226 and Southside look to be cruising at 1/52 when Col "Wobbles" Moore picks up both the infamous "Finger Man" and Peter Agnos, who shows remarkable restraint considering the send-off he is given after his duck, in the last over before tea. The cold wind does not seem to affect either "Tommy" or "Boner", as they snaffle two blinders after tea and Southside slump to 6/126 at stumps.

GRAND FINAL: WEEK TWO

The immense confidence of messrs. Booth and Reid is not felt to the same degree by other players involved, particularly "Macca", who has a big hurl in the ladies' before play. Ironically, his superb spell from the previous week is continued, and he and "Wobbles" clean up the tail to secure a first innings win with a lead of 67 runs. The Fourth Eleven, despite losing an early wicket, are steered home by their fearless skipper, Dave Snape, who knocks up 37 in the total of 233. A very slow scoring rate ensues in North Caulfield's second dig, due to some tight, accurate bowling by our bowlers, particularly Dean Slade, and then Roger Barrow, who tears the game wide open with his three victims late in the day. Things look good in the other match as well, although Dave Norris's record-breaking season ends on a low note. The Firsts bat patiently until stumps - enduring some Agnos hostility along the way - to have an overall lead of 179 with only one day to go. Unfortunately, the last day does not start well as Rob Oldershaw's Under 14 side is narrowly defeated by East Sandringham, but "Tommy" and "Diesel" put the issue beyond doubt in the "C" grade match with a stand of 105 for the fifth wicket - Shane making 50 and Noel continuing to

build on his Finals reputation with an excellent 77. The skipper unfortunately pads up to the wrong delivery and makes a duck, earning himself the new nickname of "Barbara". Southside are left with 17 overs to make 374 runs, but don't quite make it and the First Eleven secure their third Premiership. Mark McSwain is judged by the Umpires to be Most Valuable Player of the Grand Final. In the other contest, North Caulfield leave the Fourth Eleven 51 overs to compile 155 for outright victory. Things don't look good at 5/75, but old hands Snape and Burridge shut up shop and see out the rest of the match to leave their team victorious as well. Fifteen year-old Dean Slade is voted MVP to top off the club's proudest day. A number of events occur during the victory celebrations, beginning with "Chopper", "Granty" and "Kunji" smoking Cuban cigars. "Eddie" Booth's hat is burnt in a moving ceremony and Karen Snape eats chicken off the Premiership shield. Emotional speeches by Carroll, Snape and Fauvel are met with loud applause and all present enjoy a night to savour.

CRITERIA FOR NEW TROPHIES

The 'Ian Wilton' Memorial Trophy For Senior Aggregate Runs

This trophy shall be awarded to the player scoring the highest aggregate of runs in senior games for the club in the home and away season. Should two or more players achieve an identical aggregate, then the player playing in the most home and away games for the club in that season shall be declared the winner of the trophy. Should a tie still occur, then the names of two or more players shall be inscribed on the trophy. The 'Ian Wilton' Memorial Trophy will be a perpetual award, and shall not be retained by the trophy winners.

The 'Alan Johanson' Trophy For Senior Aggregate Wickets

This trophy shall be awarded to the player taking the highest aggregate of wickets in senior games for the club in the home and away season. Should two or more players achieve an identical aggregate, then the player playing in the most home and away games for the club in that season shall be declared the winner of the trophy. Should a tie still occur, then the names of two or more players shall be inscribed on the trophy. The 'Alan Johanson' Trophy will be a perpetual award, and shall not be retained by the trophy winners.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

Memorable, magnificent, joyous, exciting and, most importantly, successful. These are all adjectives that describe what has certainly been the most magnificent season that the Carnegie South Cricket Club has enjoyed. CARNEGIE SOUTH CRICKET CLUB TREASURERS REPORT FOR YEAR ENDED 30TH JUNE 1995

The 1994/95 season was extremely successful on field for the club, with two sides winners premierships and two others reaching the finals.

As a result of the club's on field successes the canteen increased its takings by over \$5,000, while the gross profits increased by over \$550. However, this was the only outstanding financial result for the season, as there were several disappointments.

Firstly, subscription fees received from players were down by \$300 from last season. This seems a small amount but the timing of subscription payments was exceptionally poor. Many players failed to make arrangements prior to the due date for payment, although most had genuine reasons for delayed payment. The disappointing aspect of subscription payments was that some players only paid their subscriptions when their respective teams made the finals. At times it was very difficult to obtain payment from players. This is one aspect of the club that must be improved if the on field success is to be matched off field.

Another area of disappointment was the attendance to the Ward Medal night. The lack of numbers cost the club about \$200 in meal costs and perhaps another \$200 in bar takings

The Income and Expenditure Statement shows net income of \$1,524, down \$400 on last season. This decline is due in part to subscriptions, which are down mainly due to a larger number of special pass memberships. Also a number of other unexpected expenses is due to new council policies, including insurance and liquor licences.

The final point I would like make is that the club is debt free after a payment made to Ron Fauvel during the season. The financial support provided by Ron and also Rob Hess has been invaluable and much appreciated.

I look forward to the continued financial support of the members through canteen purchases, subscription payments and social functions in the 1995/96 season.
